Key Structural Challenges and Paradoxes

- **The NOTA Paradox:** The 2013 NOTA judgment protects the right to reject as a fundamental right, but choosing a candidate remains statutory.
- **Informed Choice Disconnect:** The Court protects the freedom to make an informed choice under Article 19(1)(a), but not the vote itself.
- **Legislative Overreach:** The current statutory status gives Parliament absolute latitude to manipulate voter eligibility criteria arbitrarily.

Way Forward

- **Judicial Review:** The Supreme Court must revisit its old doctrines to resolve this glaring constitutional anomaly once and for all.
- **Procedural Balance:** Parliament should retain operational control over election mechanics while keeping the core right immune from political interference.
- **Institutional Accountability:** A fundamental right status will ensure stricter oversight on the Election Commission's voter registration processes.

A democracy without voters is inconceivable, and elevating the right to vote will firmly secure popular sovereignty under the Constitution.

2. Managing Urban Infrastructure Crisis in Mumbai (GS I & GS III: Urbanisation & Disaster Management)

Context:

Recent intense monsoon downpours have severely paralyzed Mumbai's transport networks and caused fatal structural collapses, highlighting how rapid urbanisation is drastically outpacing the city's climate infrastructure upgrades.

About Mumbai's Urban Infrastructure Crisis

- It is the failure of city drainage and transit systems to withstand short-burst, high-intensity climate events due to concrete overdevelopment.

Key Initiatives Taken So Far

- **BRIMSTOWAD Project:** A dedicated initiative launched after 2005 to widen stormwater networks and deploy pumping stations.
- **Pre-monsoon Desilting:** Annual clearing operations executed by the municipal body to reduce immediate localized water logging.

Key Structural and Governance Challenges

- **Fragmented Accountability:** Governance remains dangerously split between the BMC, IMD, railways, and highway authorities.
- **Outdated Design Baselines:** Finished structural projects rely on old weather assumptions that climate change has now undermined.
- **Incomplete Execution:** Crucial drainage widening works remain unfinished decades after their initial conception.

Way Forward

- **Unifying Administrative Command:** Establish a single coordinating body to clear the jurisdictional confusion between state and central entities.
- **Dynamic Climate Proofing:** Overhaul drainage design parameters to match current erratic and intense monsoon patterns.
- **Strict Construction Regulation:** Enforce immediate, mandatory pauses on hazardous construction activities during extreme weather alerts.

Simply waiting for administrative capacity to catch up with climate change is a failing strategy, requiring immediate structural integration.

3. The Right to Walk as a Fundamental Right (GS II: Polity & Governance)

Context:

Recently, a Supreme Court bench comprising Justices P.S. Narasimha and A.S. Chandurkar ruled that walking safely on footpaths is a fundamental right under Articles 19(1)(d) and 21. This landmark judgment asserts that pedestrian rights must take absolute priority over motorized vehicular traffic in urban spaces.

- It elevates safe pedestrian movement from a mere civic amenity to a constitutionally protected fundamental right.

4. Reassessing the Future of the Quad and Indo-Pacific Strategy (GS II: IR)

During the 16th India-Japan Annual Summit in New Delhi, concerns arose over the strategic future of the Quad following the U.S. Pentagon's decision to rename its Indo-Pacific Command back to the Pacific Command.

About Reassessing the Quad

- It is an evaluation of the Quadrilateral Security Dialogue's geopolitical relevance amid shifting American defense priorities.

- **Institutional Deficit:** The grouping continues to resist elevating its partnership to a formal multilateral 2+2 ministerial format.

- **Backing Agenda with Capital:** Member nations must bridge the massive funding gap to convert stated targets into hard assets.
- **Leveraging Dual-Use Capabilities:** Ensure that civilian data-sharing and monitoring networks can easily transition to military-grade applications.
- **Institutionalising Core Dialogues:** Elevate the grouping to dynamic foreign-and-defense ministerial formats to enhance strategic cohesion.

The ultimate relevance of the Quad will not be settled by strategic nomenclature in Washington, but by whether the grouping backs its security-heavy agenda with real capital.

5. Vikram-1 Rocket Launch and Payloads (GS III: Space technology)

Context:

Skyroot Aerospace is preparing to launch Vikram-1, India's first privately developed orbital-class rocket. Scheduled between July 12 and August 4, the mission will carry multiple innovative commercial payloads.



About the Vikram-1 Mission

- It is India's first private orbital launch vehicle developed by Skyroot Aerospace.
- **Total Payloads:** The orbital rocket will carry six diverse commercial payloads.
- **Mission Goal:** To provide emerging space companies a platform to test and scale systems.

Key Technology Demonstration Payloads

- **SOLARAS:** A nano-satellite developed by Graaha Space to demonstrate space capabilities.
- **Dcubed Payload:** An international payload from Germany testing orbital technologies.
- **SCOPE:** Skyroot's in-house payload designed to validate its mission technologies.
- **Embrace Robotic Arm:** Developed by Cosmoserve Space to test soft-robotic capture.
- **Debris Removal Tech:** The robotic arm aims to advance in-orbit space sustainability.

Unique Commemorative Payloads

- **Cosmic Bloom:** Diamond jewellery mounted on an aluminium base plate by Cosmos Diamonds.
- **Microart:** An 18K gold miniature rocket holding tiny sculptures by Ajay Kumar Mattewada.
- **Visionaries Honoured:** Features Sir C.V. Raman, Dr. Vikram Sarabhai, and Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalam.
- **Microscopic Precision:** Each gold sculpture is significantly smaller than a grain of rice.
